#### **MEMBER BIO: Sue Jones**

My earliest memory of any type of fiber art was of my mother teaching me to knit. She was not a knitter, but knew how to cast on and do the knit stitch. She had some double-pointed needles, yarn, and a book, The Complete Book of Knitting, copyright 1947, which I still have. I "knitted" some squares that became skirts for my Barbie doll.

At fourteen, I went to a local yarn shop and, with instruction, was able to knit a cardigan. Over the next several years, I did some knitting, taught myself to crochet, did crewel embroidery, needlepoint, and cross stitch. My mother also taught me to sew, and I made my own clothes.

When I was eight years old, the only toy I wanted for Christmas was the Little Red Spinning Wheel. Apparently so did every other little girl that year, and sadly, my parents were unable to get it for me. I recently saw one at an estate sale and found that it didn't really spin, it was more like spool knitting, so no big loss!

In the late 1990's, while searching for information about learning to weave, I met Madeline Adkins at the Wool Center at the NYS Fair, and she encouraged me to come to a spinners' guild meeting. At the September meeting, she taught me to spin on her wheel, an Adkins wheel built by her husband. We were both driving from Oswego and agreed to carpool to meetings, which allowed me to get to know her and hear wonderful stories. She was one of the founding members of the guild and was a wealth of knowledge and much of what I know came from her. At that first meeting, I rented a Louet wheel from a member and over the next month spun my first yarn. Unfortunately, I didn't know that you were supposed to spin in one direction and ply in the other. The result was a massive tangled mess, which I promptly threw away! I later learned to use a drop spindle and was able to spin a skein of usable yarn, which I still have.

I have been a member since 1998, and in 2000 was able to buy my dream wheel, the Schacht Matchless. I love spinning on it, but knew that as time went by, I would need a lighter travel wheel, so I bought a Schacht Sidekick. I have a Woolee Winder that is interchangeable between the two wheels, as well as the flyer, whorls, and bobbins. If you can afford it, the Woolee Winder is a wonderful accessory that makes spinning easier and faster. I recently added a Schacht Baby Wolf loom to my equipment.

I've been attending the NYS Sheep and Wool Festival since 1999 and the Maryland Festival since 2000. In the early years, I traveled to the festivals with members Marquette Bennett, Diane Tice, and Marilee Williams, who became lifetime friends. Marquette dubbed us the Rhinebeck Rhinos and the Frederick Four depending on which festival we were attending. Many wonderful times were had and great memories formed. Sadly, Marquette passed away a few years ago, but whenever we can, the remaining three of us travel together to the festivals. Another fond memory was a trip to Rhinebeck with a large contingency of guild members camping in cabins at a KOA campground in nearby Saugerties. We shared a great bring-a-dish-to-pass meal, campfire, and wonderful companionship, besides all the great shopping at the festival. I have met so many wonderful people over the years and have made many lifetime friends.

My favorite fibers to spin are BFL, Finn, Polwarth, Targhee, and Shetland. I prefer to buy my fiber processed, dyed, and ready to spin, and usually chain-ply my yarn. I knit whenever I have the opportunity, knitting socks, scarves, cowls, sweaters, and hats and mittens for my grandchildren.

I also enjoy gardening, singing, baking, and hiking with my husband. We have three grown children and five grandchildren.

Something that people might not know about me is that I learned carpentry at night school with my husband when we were 21, and we built our first home completely by ourselves. Prior to my teaching career, I worked with my husband as a home remodeler. We also did most of the work, both inside and out, on our current home. My husband's carpentry skills have been very helpful in my crafting. He has built me a blending board, a warping board, and shelving to store equipment and weaving yarns. He also assembled and applied finish to my first spinning wheel, which was a kit with no instructions that a member found at a garage sale.

I would highly recommend any spinner/knitter/handicrafter to volunteer at any guild demonstration event, no matter your skill level or experience. Some of our best demonstrators are the people with less experience, because they can easily relate to the people who are hesitant to try. It is very rewarding and people are very easy to talk to and are interested in anything we can offer.
